Black, Hispanic, and Tribal Producer Wholesale Marketing Survey

Virginia Tech and Illinois Tech invite Black, Hispanic, and Tribal farmers and ranchers to participate in the Wholesale Marketing and Technical Assistance Survey. This survey aims to identify the unique technical assistance needs, challenges, and best practices for scaling into wholesale markets. If you have experience selling wholesale or plan to access wholesale markets, your insights are invaluable. The survey takes approximately 10 minutes to complete and will help shape programs, policies, and services designed to support producers like you.

Agroforestry Assistance Opportunity

The Nature Conservancy and multiple partners, including Appalachian Sustainable Development (ASD), have launched a 5-year project to catalyze significant private investments into agroforestry while increasing farmers' income and delivering environmental benefits. Eligible farmers in 29 states, including all Central Appalachia, will soon have an opportunity to apply for financial and technical assistance for agroforestry plantings. Applications will begin being accepted Friday, January 31, 2025.

Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production Grants

Recipients of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production (UAIP) competitive grants, including community gardens and nonprofit farms, will increase food production and access in economically distressed communities, provide job training and education, and support the development of business plans and zoning proposals. The program offers grants for a wide range of activities, including planning and implementation. Planning activities focus on initiating or expanding efforts involving farmers, gardeners, citizens, government officials, schools, and other stakeholders in urban areas and suburbs. Implementation activities aim to accelerate existing and emerging urban, indoor, and other agricultural practices that benefit farmers and communities.

Technical Assistance Funding to Land-Grant Universities

The interagency agreement between NRCS and NIFA will fund the hiring of Urban Agriculture Conservation Extension Educators through cooperative extension programs at land-grant universities. These educators will work with NRCS employees in 27 cities nationwide that USDA has designated as urban priority locations, delivering technical assistance and linking producers to NRCS conservation planning and program opportunity.
